Once again, our '09 graduate Andeisha Farid took the lead and spoke before the Council and at the conference – we just can't say enough how proud we are of her!

Yacoobi was nominated for the 2005 Nobel Peace Prize.

All of the discussions were lively and informative -- audience members were standing up asking how could they help. Shedding light on such an important issue as literacy is critical when moving forward in war-torn countries, because without the foundation of literacy and education, what progress can be made?
